#### **Step 3: Saving Seeds**

Seeds are a genetic goldmine. When we save seeds, we're passing on the genetic qualities of the plant that provided them. Please read the Black Mountain Blooms brochure, How to Save Seeds and other seed saving

information (see Learn More).

Even when you are planning to save "easy" seeds (beans, lettuce, peas, tomatoes, etc.), we recommend planting one



variety of each plant to help prevent accidental cross-pollination plus read seed saving methods for that plant and information on the seed package.

"Advanced" seeds (carrots, corn, squash, etc.) require special planning. Learn how by checking out books and read online at seedsavers.org/learn.

# **Step 4: Sharing Seeds**

Collect seeds from your healthiest, disease-free, productive plants. Keep them for next year's growing season. If you wish, donate some to our library. Place some in our provided envelopes and bring them into the library staff.

## **Sowing Circle Series**

During the growing season, we offer a free monthly gardening programs for the community. Topics range from gardening for butterflies, growing root vegetables, growing from seeds, and others. Our classes are in partnership

with Buncombe County Extension Master Gardener Volunteers. Classes are taught by Master Gardener Volunteers, Sow True Seed employees, and other passionate gardeners.

#### Why Start Seeds?

Growing from seeds offers:

- Greater supply of plant varieties
- Control of when to start plants
- Better control of the health of plants
- Growing and saving seeds should help with saving money
- Most seeds are viable for several years
- Connecting with others or your family's food heritage

#### Why Save Seeds?

The practice of saving seeds has been around for more than 12,000 years. Today, seed saving helps us to develop stronger seeds that are better adapted

to our climate. It also saves us money.

Because seed saving is part of our heritage and traditions, it's one way we can come together



as a community. When we grow food, our community grows. That's why Black Mountain Blooms started the free Seed Lending Library in March 2018.

#### **Step 1: Choosing Seeds**

Our seed collection depends on donations, growing success, and seasonal changes. We'll have different seeds available at different times, so please check back with us frequently to see what's new.

If you're a beginner gardener, don't worry about saving seeds right now. Instead, select the seeds that you're interested in growing.



Focus first on having fun and learning how to garden. The seed part will come later!

# **Seed Library Organization**

The seed collection is organized by flowers, herbs and vegetables and packages are alphabetized behind each group. Looking for particular seed? We have an A-Z listing of our seed collection by plant name on the potting bench and in the binder.

# **Step 2: Borrowing Seeds**

- 1. Have a NC library card,
- 2. Complete a Membership Form and give it to the library staff,

- 3. Borrow 2-3 seeds per plant to grow and place in coin envelope,
- 4. Borrow up to 20 plant varieties a growing season and
- 5. Record seeds in Member's Seed Record and file it in binder.
